mart Border Management'was the theme of the eighth edition of FICCI's Homeland Security conference, organised in partnership with India Foundation. N. N. Vohra, Governor of Jammu & Kashmir, Government of India, who inaugurated the conference underlined the need to ensure that the welfare and the needs of the people living along our national borders were attended to with alacrity. This approach, he emphasised, would go a long way in providing strong support to the Border Security Force and the Army by way of information on border incursion and logistics support. Our cover story in this issue carries a detailed report on the topic.

In order to make India a global human resource hub and achieve sustainability in skill development, the private sector needs to employ only trained and certified workers. This was stated by Rohit Nandan, Secretary, Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship, Government of India, at the ninth edition of annual flagship skills conference, Global Skills Summit (GSS) on the theme 'Skilling for the future', organized by FICCI in association with the Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship. The Secretary said that the government had handed over the entire skilling ecosystem to the private sector and it was now industry's responsibility to benchmark the standards and train the workforce accordingly and make them employable not just within India but also overseas. FICCI-CMSME's sixth annual MSME Summit on the theme 'Propelling MSME Growth: Ways & Means' was inaugurated by K K Jalan, Secretary, Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME). He urged the MSMEs to update the details of their enterprises on the MSME data bank, as the updated data would be used for evolving parameters for the growth of MSMEs in the country.

Categorization of security guards as 'skilled' and armed security guards and security supervisors as 'highly skilled' workers is on the cards. This was announced by Bandaru Dattatreya, Minister of State (Independent Charge) of Labour and Employment, Government of India, while addressing FICCI's Private Security Industry Conclave. The conclave was significant in view of the increase in globalisation of business operations in the country which has highlighted the need for better urban security with a technologically-advance and mechanically-complex security network.
