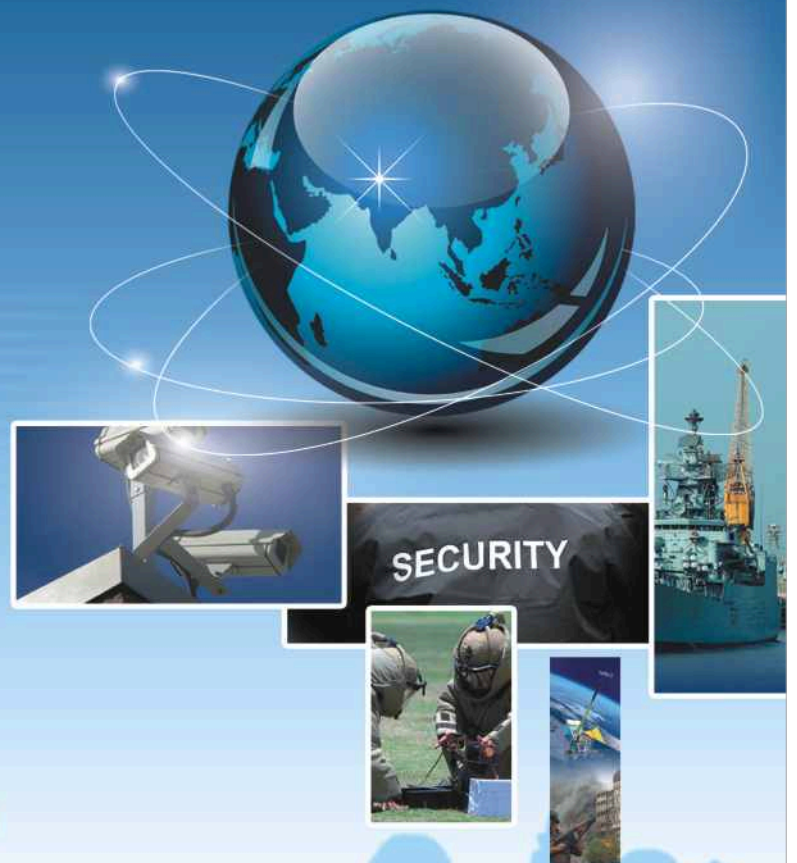

0900 – 1000 Hrs	Registration
1000 – 1100 Hrs	Inaugural Session
1100 – 1130 Hrs	Tea / Coffee Break
1130 – 1200 Hrs	Keynote Address 9/11 was a watershed in human history followed by coordinated bombings against the commuter train system of Madrid, Spain in 2004 that affected 1800 people; 7th July London bombings that targeted the public transport system and 26/11 Mumbai attacks in India have forced the Governments to ensure preparedness. The Keynote Address will unravel the concept of Homeland Security, various frameworks in other countries and lessons for India.
1200 – 1330 Hrs	Session 1: Safe & Secure City: Reality or Myth Indian cities today have a fast growing, migratory population and divergent socio-economic strata. Monitoring of activities related to Homeland Security is therefore a challenge. To keep city centers safe, protect public buildings, streets, public parks, and more importantly, prevent potential crimes & violations, various security mechanisms should be deployed in towns and cities. The session would comprise of a panel discussion on current security scenario in the major Indian cities, their initiatives for crime reduction, security of important places – airports, railway stations, hospitals, schools etc. The panelists will also speak on the role of citizens and industries in crime reduction and more importantly, on the role of security audits in ensuring city safety.
1330 – 1430 Hrs	Lunch
1430 – 1600 Hrs	Session 2: Security aspects in Urban Planning Security issues have begun to play an increasingly important role in the society. It is therefore necessary to understand the interaction between community oriented & personal security aspects in city landscapes and how security can be made a part of the existing urban fabric in India. The session would focus on incorporating city surveillance, building security, architecture, physical design of public spaces etc. as aspects of urban design.

1630 – 1800 hrs	Session 3: City Security through Technology (Equipments) The physical security solution should meet the needs of today's most demanding public safety operations which require faster, more efficient incident identification, investigation, response, and resolution. The focus of the session will be on the available security equipments and solutions that would meet the ever changing requirements.

1000 – 1100 Hrs	<p><i>Session 4: Indian Private Security Market and its Regulation</i></p> <p>India's private security industry is estimated to be worth over \$600 million. However, only 60% of this is organized sector. 'Manned guarding' accounts for the major share of revenues. In the scenario, where the police citizen ratio is less than the minimum standard, the industry can help in maintaining the safe and secure environment. The growing demand of this unorganized segment makes regulation mandatory.</p> <p>The panel discussion would focus on the implications of the growth in Private Security Market, the need for regulation, skill development, standardization, HR issues etc.</p>
1100 – 1115 Hrs	<p><i>Tea/ Coffee Break</i></p>
1115 – 1300 Hrs	<p><i>Session 5: City Security through Information Technology</i></p> <p>The session will cover the role of information technology in making cities secure. The discussion will evaluate the current state of IT usage in security, its benefits, and key areas like Robotics, Biometric etc.</p> <p>The session would also elaborate on future investments in IT for safe and secure city.</p>
1300 – 1345 Hrs	<p><i>Session 6: Framework for Safe & Secure City</i></p> <p>Lack of standardization and uniformity has been one of the major drawbacks in the area of security. Smart/safe cities cannot function without this basic premise. Systems have to be connected to each other for effective delivery. To build a city ready enough to respond to any eventuality, human or natural, the components required are :</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● ERP solution for database creation and information processing ● GIS based Crime Analysis and Reporting Engine ● Command and Control Center ● Interception Systems ● Tetra Radio Network ● Video Surveillance System ● Automatic Vehicle Location System <p>The session aims to create a blueprint of a Safe & Secure city framework.</p>
