## A Prelude to the Tamil Nadu Global Investors Meet 2015

### **Traditional Industries of Tamil Nadu – Overview**

FICCI Tamil Nadu State Council with the support of the Government of Tamil Nadu conducted the Traditional Industries Exposition 2015. The Traditional Industry Expo had been designed to showcase and promote the industries that are native to the state of Tamil Nadu such as Textiles, Leather, Handicrafts and Handlooms. The event was conducted as a prelude event to the Global Investors Meet 2015 highlighting industrial culture of Tamil Nadu even in the bygone era. The event was partnered by Poompuhar, Cooptex, NIFT and Dakshinchitra.

The Textile Industry of Tamil Nadu has a significant presence in the National and State economy. It is the forerunner in Industrial development and in providing massive employment in the State. Handloom, Powerloom, Spinning, Processing, Garment and Hosiery are the various sectors of the Textile Industry in Tamil Nadu. It is the largest economic activity next only to Agriculture in providing direct and indirect employment. Handloom Sector occupies a place of pride in preserving the country's heritage and culture and plays a vital role in the economy of the country. It has a long tradition par excellence in its craftsmanship. The Powerloom Sector in Tamil Nadu has also been playing an important role in meeting the clothing needs of the people. The Powerloom Sector in Tamil Nadu is next only to Maharashtra in terms of number of looms. The Textiles Sector in Tamil Nadu is predominantly in the private sector, spinning oriented and labour-intensive because of the preponderance of the decentralized sector in most of the segments of the industry. The Textile Industry has a very important role to play in the industrial field with regard to employment potential, overall economic and commercial activities. This Industry enables the Central and State Governments to earn substantial revenue besides foreign exchange through exports.

Out of 1,083 tanneries in India, more than half i.e 577 are in Tamil Nadu and of the 577, Chennai City and the North Arcot district account for as many as 397 tanneries. The production in Tamil Nadu is 44% of the total all-India production. Over 66% of the total production in Tamil Nadu is from the Chennai and North Arcot regions. Tamil Nadu has emerged on top with highest share of about 35 per cent in total leather and leather products' exports from India as of 2012-13, according to a recently concluded sector-specific study by apex industry.

The handicrafts of Tamil Nadu showcase the profuse history of Tamil culture and traditions that has grown over the ages. The different crafts of Tamil Nadu add elegance and splendor to lifestyles of People in Tamil Nadu and all over the world. The various crafts of Tamil Nadu include Tanjore Paintings, Jewelry, Woodcarving, Stone Carving, Pottery etc. The traditional ornate paintings, known as Tanjore paintings of Tamil Nadu are most distinct paintings of the state. These paintings use pure gold foils and semi precious stones for decoration.

The Indian Gems & Jewellery Industry is the back bone of the economy by being one of the major contributors towards the export led growth of India. The industry has gained global popularity because of its talented craftsmen, its superior practices in cutting and polishing fine diamonds and precious stones and its cost efficiencies. The two major segments of the industry are gold jewellery (covers around 80% of the jewellery market) and diamonds. India is one of the world's largest manufacturers of cut and polished diamond with an aggregate contribution of approx. 60% of the world's supply in terms of value and 80% in terms of volume

Thiru P.Thangamani, Hon'ble Minister for Industries and Transport, Govt. of Tamil Nadu inaugurated the exposition and distributed awards to the artisans involved in this sector for their contribution.



The event was organized at the Chennai Trade Centre, Nandambakkam on  $21^{st} - 23^{rd}$  August 2015 and received about 5000 -7000 participants. The event was completely designed with the technical assistance for design from the National Institute of Fashion Technology (NIFT) and brought together about 100 stalls comprising of Artisans from Dakshinchitra who demonstrated live preparations of Terracotta creations, Anakpattur Weavers Association who demonstrated how Sareees were made from Banana Fibre, Organic Materials etc.

It also had handicrafts section taken up exclusively by Poompuhar and local vendors who are engaged in producing such items. This was followed by the handlooms section where Cooptex had an exclusive stalls promoting the traditional silk sarees and various saress along with the handlooms district weavers society from various districts who displayed a variety of Sarees and ethnic dresses. The Gems and Jewellery featured famous jewellers and diamond merchants showcasing their products with traditional designs. The Leather section was quiet modern displaying leather items from bags, belts, shoes to wallets.



The models adorned with Challani jewellery, angavastrams from Co-optex and designer Ayaz's creativity walked the ramp in sarees with knotted pallus, veshtis, and jeans too

We saw other rounds that included low-cut flowing gowns, knee-length skirts and other silhouettes of the west, but they held the traditional materials and the work of our own designers.

Mullai, representing the aroma of jasmine and the fertile lands from which it originates, quite predictably featured a lot of white paired with fresh, bright colours like green and orange. Neidhal, representing the varied shades of the sea, from azure to midnight blue, showcased contemporary silhouettes, including off-shoulder gowns and pallazzo pants. Most of the designs featured traditional outfits, like saris, anarkalis and lehengas.

Sumathi, who designed the Marutham collection, said, "The poets of those days compared human emotions to Nature. We have tried to do the same with fashion and design. My collection is meant to represent the lush green plains and fertile paddy fields, and so I picked it for the colours I could work with." The collection, which she jointly worked on with her sister, revolved around a palette of earthy greens and browns. And while she would have loved to work with cottons, she added, "It might not work well on the ramp, so we went with Benarasi and crepe silks."

Gold was another common theme running through the collections, and was incorporated in zardosi work, heavy embroidery and through the antique and temple jewellery by Challani Jewellery.
